Life Changes - At our Café Style Service on June 10th led by Rosemary we were considering changes that happened in our life time but mostly the changes that had come about during the sixty years of her Majesty Queen **Elizabeth II's reign. This included such items as conversion to monetary decimalisation and metric weights/measures.**

Childhood/teenage photographs of some members of the congregation were also on show, comparing (for better or for worse — I hasten to add mostly for better) how our features had changed over the years. Although it has to be said that some of the photographs exhibited pre-dated our present Queen's reign.

We looked at different versions of the Bible most of which have been published during the last sixty years. It is worth remembering that a Bible **was given to the Queen at Her Majesty's Coronation. It was described as the world's most valuable gift. With this in mind a Souvenir Diamond Jubilee edition** of the New Testament was created to give out at schools, churches and street parties.

Churches across the nation gave out thousands to pupils, shoppers, day care centres and community events. These have been produced by HOPE, Biblica and the Church of England. The demand from the churches has far exceeded expectations with over 655,000 copies distributed over the Diamond Jubilee weekend.

It is estimated that 1 in 100 UK citizens will receive this special edition attractive New Testament, which includes 8 pages of photographs of the Queens Coronation and life, plus Bible references to help people understand the **Good News of Jesus Christ's death and resurrection and its** relevance today. Creaton purchased 50 copies and distributed them to the young people at the service; I am pleased to say some of the parents present requested a copy.

Our prayer is that many in our country will read these New Testaments and through the word, find their way to faith in Jesus Christ.
